Thom Reilly

Thom Reilly is currently the director of the Morrison Institute for Public Policy; and Professor, School of Public Affairs at the Arizona State University. The Morrison Institute is an applied public policy think tank engaged in a variety of national, state and local public policy issues. For more information visit <https://morrisoninstitute.asu.edu>

Previously, Reilly served as county executive of Clark County, Nevada (a regional and municipal government covering the Las Vegas valley). As chief executive officer of Clark County, he was responsible for a \$5.8 billion budget and 12,000 employees.

Reilly is also managing principal and founder of The Reilly Group, a management consulting firm focused on public and non-profit organizations. He has held senior administrative positions with the State of Nevada, overseeing income maintenance programs and the statewide child welfare system. He also served as vice president for social responsibility for Caesars Entertainment, Inc. and as director and professor for the School of Social Work at San Diego State University.

He is a Fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration (NAPA). His research focuses on governance issues, trends in public pay and benefits, and child welfare issues. Reilly is co-editor for *Ethics, Corruption and Governance Series* for Rowman & Littlefield Lexington Books. He received his BA in social work from the University of Memphis; an MSW from Arizona State University; and his MPA and doctorate in public administration from the University of Southern California.

His recent books include, *The Failure of Governance in Bell, California: Big-Time Corruption in a Small Town* (Lexington Books, 2016); *Rethinking Public Sector Compensation: What Ever Happened to the Public Interest?* (M. I was responsible for the fiscal management of the County's \$5.8 billion budget. I provide administrative oversight for 38 diverse and geographically dispersed departments. During my tenure I was known for innovative governance practices including instituting increased transparency in the budgeting process and creating a host of citizen involvement/engagement activities; establishing a pay-for performance compensation system for employees; championing regional governance efforts in the area of business license, air quality, homelessness and planning; initiating an enterprise performance management and measurement program to ensure that County's services, strategic plan, budget, performance and results were integrated; and restructuring the tax rate components in the county budget that increased the County's flexibility in addressing indigent and homeless program and services .

As Associate Professor of the School of Social Work, I taught both undergraduate and graduate level courses. I served as Chair, Admissions, Masters of Social Work Program; Chair, Administration, Practice and Planning Sequence and as Member of the Child Welfare Sequence; Policy Sequence; PhD Planning Committee; Faculty Senate Committee, Priority and New Program Review. I also taught courses in the Department of Public Administration.

As Director of Clark County Administrative Services, I served as the chief administrative officer and was responsible for administering and planning Clark County's legislative and intergovernmental initiatives, franchise agreements, emergency management, policy and program development, and strategic planning efforts.

As Deputy Administrator for the Nevada Division of Child and Family Services, I was responsible for the administration of child welfare services (Centralized Intake/Assessment, Family Preservation, Child Protective Services, Substitute Care, and Adoptions) for the State of Nevada.
