**1. CALL MEETING TO ORDER**

Speaker Murphy called the virtual meeting to order at 5:30 pm. The presiding secretary was Viviane Ugalde.

**2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

**3. ROLL CALL**

Speaker Murphy, Senators Ahmed, Casildo Rios, Chantyanon, Doyle, Harvey, Huber, Keller, Kidd, Lopez, Luers, McElhoes, Nugent, Priess, Ramirez, Ribeiro, Romero, Stoddard, Supple, Taylor, Torres, and Yang were present.

Senator Bourgalt was Tardy Unexcused.

A quorum was present.

**4. ADOPTION OF MINUTES**

- a. The Senate will consider the approval of the minutes from April 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020. The Senate will discuss the minutes of April 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020 and may choose to amend or edit the minutes. Upon conclusion of the discussion, the Senate may choose to approve the minutes.

Speaker Murphy seeked a motion to approve the minutes for April 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020 by unanimous consent.

Senator Supple moved to approve the minutes for April 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020 by unanimous consent.

The motion was carried.

**5. PUBLIC COMMENT**

Dr. Shannon Ellis said that the entire senate body was doing a great job, and she knew it would get better. She wanted to talk about the CARES Fund they received, which is Coronavirus aid, relief, and economic recovery service fund that contains seven million dollars to help students whose life was disrupted by the campus shutting down. She said that the federal government gave the university the money based on how many Pell Grant Student Recipients are at the university, and who were FAFS eligible, in good academic standing, in a degree program as of this semester, in a majority of in-person classes, and had to demonstrate to the institution that your life was disrupted by the shutdown. She said they created a

process to give students the money by creating a simple form of the information they need to make the award to give the award. She said they would reserve the 60% of the funds for those who were economically struggling the most. She said 25% were for students who were financially stable, but lost a job, or became unstable a different way. She said the other 15% are for students over the summer who did not realize the impact until later. She said they received the seven million dollars last week, and then started giving the funds out on April 29<sup>th</sup>. She said there is a page on the website about the funds on parent resources, student resources, Facebook, Instagram, and other pages. She said that as of 11:00 am, they had 664,000 application and they had awarded \$5,485 students as of 2:00 pm today, making up \$2.25 million. She explained why some students who did apply did not receive the funds. She asked if anyone had any question.

Speaker Murphy said that she had been incredibly helpful with giving responsive and transparent information.

Senator Harvey asked if the government or university decided that students had to meet SAP.

Dr. Ellis said it was the federal government's regulation, and they originally was not going to put any guidelines on the way to access funds.

Senator Yang asked if students should go through the CARES Act before the emergency fund.

Dr. Ellis said yes, because they have been thinking about offering a second round of funds to students who have already applied.

Senator Stoddard asked where the summer funds would be going.

Dr. Ellis said it would be used under the same system that they are handing out funds now, and not putting it in a scholarship or anything.

Senator Ribeiro asked what some resources students can use who are not eligible for these funds.

Dr. Ellis said the Dean of Students emergency fund could help, but it is used as a bit of a Band-Aid. She said some grant money from the office of international students and scholars could also help for students who are not citizens. She also said they have been telling students who are not citizens to fill out a form that is a version of the FAFSA for those who are undocumented, and some funds are set aside for those students to access with that form.

Senator Keller asked if students have to send in a second application for a second rounds of funds, or what the process was.

Dr. Ellis said she was not quite sure, but they would probably contact students when they are ready to do a second round of funds, so that they would not have to reapply.

Senator Doyle asked if there is a communication back or place of contact for students who have applied, but have not received funds.

Dr. Ellis said that it may be because there was a problem with an NSHE ID mistype, and because they have to be manually corrected, that may be why there was no contact back. She said to contact Financial Aid just in case, if they do not receive any communications back so that they can help correct any problems.

Speaker Murphy thanked Dr. Ellis again for coming to give information.

Dr. Ellis reemphasized said that if any students have any issues at all around the CARES Act she would be happy to unpack any questions any student or senator had.

## **6. REPORTS OF ASUN OFFICERS**

The Speaker shall recognize any senior officer of the Association, including the Secretary, to offer a report on his or her official activities since the previous meeting and make any summary announcements he or she deems necessary for no longer than five minutes.

**a. President of the Associated Students, Dominique Hall**

President Hall reported that last week she met with Dan Thomas to plan and research for the emergency housing fund. She said she also had her weekly meeting with President Johnson about student concerns. She said they also discussed Governor Sisolak's phase fund, and she will reach out to all Greek Life groups. She also broke down her and Vice President Brown's thoughts of what created their budget, which would be on the table later tonight.

**b. Vice President of the Associated Students, Austin Brown**

Vice President Brown reported that he met with GSA with the UNR module for resources. He said he also discussed orientation with Dr. Rodriguez and Amy Koeckes. He said he also attended the SMAB advisory board of how the publications will be moving to online for the COVID-19 restrictions. He said he also will be sitting on a board to appoint two media editors this Friday. He said he was also in the weekly meeting President Johnson about student concerns with attending school on campus in the fall semester.

**c. Chief of Staff, Demitri Bannoura**

Chief of Staff Bannoura reported that he was contacting with President Hall for the tools for communication and collaboration for the executive board, and platform options for it. He said he wanted to set up weekly meetings with President Hall about what she needs from him, and reading Governor Sisolak's plan to find out how to plan the upcoming retreat.

**d. Director of Clubs and Organizations, Nolan Lanza**

Director Lanza reported that he was planning out the department with Dr. Rodriguez of possible options for things on and off campus. He said they needed to be creative and make incentives to have clubs renew and be involved on campus. He said they will start with club renewal training this weekend for clubs who are trying to renew, and he looks forward to senate meeting is coalition members later tonight.

**e. Director of Event Programming, Wes Fullmer**

Director Fullmer reported that he was continuing to work on the event calendar and training schedule for his department and hope to have them done next week. He said he also wanted to create an accountability contract for his officers. He said they have been discussing new ideas and goals of his nominees as well.

**f. Director of Legislative Affairs, Alexa Rangel**

Director Rangel reported that she just finished her hiring process and have her appointments at the next senate meeting. She said she had also been building relationships with other universities for legislative goals, and will be discussing legislative priorities with Senator Doyle soon.

**g. Director of Diversity and Inclusion, Priya Bajwa**

Director Bajwa reported that she finished hiring her department, and they would have their first meeting Friday to prepare for senate and discuss their goals. She also met with her advisor Haley Summers to talk about contingency strategies and goals of working with other departments.

**h. Director of Sustainability, Elizabeth Guillen**

Director Guillen reported that she was creating a backup plan to her goals for the COVID-19 restrictions. She said she was working with director of Public relations on some sustainable tip ideas on the social media platforms.

**i. Director of Campus and Public Relations, Kyla Kwan**

Director Kwan reported that she was working on the logistics of the mentioned sustainability campaign. She said she was constantly working with Inkblot to outline social media overall as well, in order to start to showcase ASUN more often. She also said workorders for promotional material would be through Inkblot, which would be a part of their budget.

**j. Director of Campus Wellness, Parker Samuelson**

Director Samuelson reported that she was working on contacting different organizations and committees on plans for the upcoming year, and on promoting holistic wellness through social media. She said she met with former director Feil to see where she could continue on other projects that were started as well.

**k. Attorney General, Paige Flippin**

Attorney General Flippin reported that she was reviewing all government documents and attended the Government Operations Committee today, as well as a meeting later for Parliamentarian Harvey.

**l. Speaker of the Senate, Keegan Murphy**

Speaker Murphy said that he met with President Johnson about the Cares Funding, child care, and mental health, summer session classes, the GSA council, and other aspects of COVID-19 restrictions. He said that we will be responsible as student leaders for making masks fashionable if they have to be worn on campus during the fall semester. He also said they held a workshop on how to write legislation on Sunday and that it went well. Speaker Murphy said they discussed dates for retreat if it can be in person, and that for outreach it was great that senators were meeting with their dean soon. He mentioned three senate positions are open, and two have applied for CHS seats. He said your first pay check would be received May 10<sup>th</sup>, if they have not gotten one yet, and they would get a pay increase on July 25<sup>th</sup> according to Dr. Rodriguez. On May 15<sup>th</sup> there would be a new senator training as well. He said next week is the last senate meeting of the senator, which would be longer due to appointments and legislation, which is due tomorrow to him by 5 pm. The next senate meeting after that is May 27<sup>th</sup>. He also mentioned that if you abstain from a vote, to not discuss what you like about the candidate during the discussion period, and to say that you will abstain during that period for transparency.

## **7. REPORT OF THE SENATE COMMITTEES**

Senator Yang reported that they had their last meeting yesterday and finalized the accountability contract and duties of the committee. She said that they also assigned all ten liaison positions as well.

Senator Huber said they went over the budget last Friday, which would be on the table tonight, and their last meeting would be this Friday to discuss goals for financial reviews.

Senator Doyle reported that at their last meeting they met all of the CSE staff. He said they discussed further committee goals and Senator Keller's interest in the CARE act and Senator Bourgalt's interest in working with Nevada Refugees Organization. He also said he would be discussing legislative priorities with the Legislative Department Head.
- d.** Chair, Committee on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion--Senator Ribeiro  
Senator Ribeiro said their last meeting would be this Friday, where they would talk about liaison positions, and she had added senator reports to open more conversation. She said she has meetings with the deans from her college for her outreach as a senator, and she was able to discuss the faculty committee on diversity within the college as well. She said she also met with the director of The Center Every Student Every Story and talked about concerns they had and goals to be cohesive in solving them, as well as the availability of having online trainings for the committee. She said she had a meeting set up with the legal immigrations services at UNLV and with a representative from this university.
- e.** Chair, Committee on Government Operations--Senator Supple  
Senator Supple reported that they signed an accountability contract, and discussed some legislation that would include the parliamentarian onto the committee on oversight which was from Senator Stoddard.
- f.** Chair, Committee on the Safety, Sustainability, and Wellness--Senator Luers  
Senator Luers reported that last Thursday Senator Torres was elected as their vice chair. He said they also discussed liaison positions and committee goals for the committee. He said they discussed legislation which would be on the table tonight as well.
- g.** Speaker Pro-Tempore--Senator Supple  
Senator Supple reported that after last senate meeting, she reached out to the newly appointed directors to discuss difficulties they face now with COVID-19 and what they can work with on Zoom. She said she also discussed accountability with the senators with Speaker Murphy.
- h.** Parliamentarian--Senator Harvey  
Senator Harvey reported that she was a part of the legislation writing workshop. She also said she was working on trainings with Attorney General Flippin as well. Her tip of the week was that a helpful tool was to use the previous question rule. She said if debate is getting a little out of hand or not productive, they can use it to vote on the matter at hand, and end the debate.
- i.** Chair, Committee on Oversight--Speaker Murphy  
Speaker Murphy reported that their last meeting was today, and they discussed the similarities in accountability contracts among all committees, especially on absences.

Speaker Murphy said that was a question they should have asked during the appointing process of the directors.

Director Fullmer said for transparency he was hiring a programmer who is his roommate, but they do have experience in the department of programming and was previously an intern. He said their experience was why they were hired, and not because they were roommates.

Director Fullmer introduced all of his programming nominees. He gave a background on all of the candidates and what he was looking for during the interviewing process.

Senator Doyle thanked Director Fullmer for clarifying his question.

Speaker Murphy asked if there was any dissent to the consent agenda.

All appointments were carried.

Speaker Murphy and the sixteen appointees recited and read the oath: “I, state your full name, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the Associated Students; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter.”

Sixteen club commissioners and programmers were appointed into their positions.

Speaker Murphy seeked a motion to approve S.B. 88 – An Act to Approve the Budget for Fiscal Year 2021.

Senator Romero moved to approve S.B. 88 – An Act to Approve the Budget for Fiscal Year 2021.

Senator Luers seconded the motion.

The motion was carried.

Senator Huber presented the legislation. He broke down what the 10% cut and increase in funds ASUN would be receiving was designed for compared to last year's budget. He also explained what the fringe increase was in this session, and how it was related to state rules. He said that Sound and Lights also got cut completely. He also said the CSE budget got a new account for a program that ASUN will be using.

Senator Doyle asked why they still have the new students initiative fund even though orientation was moved online.

Senator Huber said he also asked about it and that the funds would be used throughout the whole year for similar events, even though orientation would not be in person.

Vice President Brown said that it was implemented on previous suggestions from former Vice President Flangas, and her thoughts that they needed more funds for events outside of orientation.

Senator Harvey asked for more detail on the new initiative that was being moved into the CSE account.

President Hall said it was for Campus Labs and that it would be \$35,000 of the \$120,000 that ASUN would contribute, as well as other departments because it is a university wide program.

Senator Doyle asked if there was an increase in interaction with student media, since their operations and wages went up.

Senator Huber said that they were increasing the pay or hiring more, and that is why there was a wage increase. He said that the simplified justifications would outline the increases as well.

Senator Harvey asked why the retreat budget was bigger.

Vice President Brown said that last year as Chief of Staff, he found that the budget was not always built for two retreats, and he thought that was problematic and that both retreats should have allocations.

Senator Doyle asked if there was a justification for increasing the Legislative Department only a little.

Senator Huber said it was to reach out to other events, and to send representatives to those events.

President Hall said that they gave the department more of a percent increase than what was recommended in the memorandum written by the 87<sup>th</sup> session.

Senator Huber said that President Hall and Vice President Brown made a lot of clear justifications which lay out percentages, increases and would answer any other questions the body may have now or later.

Speaker Murphy said the budget was created as if there was a 10% budget cut, but if that did not happen, they would discuss where to allocate extra funds.

Senator Doyle said he appreciated the justifications, but would encourage authors to describe their answers for students who only see the budget in the memo.

Speaker Murphy moved to a vote.

The motion was carried.

b. S.R. 88 – A Resolution in Support of Implementing Protected Bicycle Paths in Washoe County

Speaker Murphy sought a motion to approve S.R. 88 – A Resolution in Support of Implementing Protected Bicycle Paths in Washoe County.

Senator Romero moved to approve S.R. 88 – A Resolution in Support of Implementing Protected Bicycle Paths in Washoe County.

Senator Chantiyanon seconded the motion.

The motion was carried.

Senator Luers and Torres presented the legislation based on information that committees received about a master plan for Reno in 2025 for protected bicycle paths with RTC and other safety aspects.

Senator Supple said she liked the idea for the legislation. She also said that the legislation referenced a website, but the website did not work, so she would like more explanation on the statistic around the website.

Senator Luers said it was a link to a news article of pedestrian safety of 2018 which said there were more than double pedestrian deaths.

Senator Harvey asked if there was a difference between regular and protected bike paths.

Senator Luers said the difference was either a physical barrier, or it is separated by a certain distance between the road and the path.

Senator Doyle moved to amend the resolution on page 4 to strike out line items 1 and 2.

Senator Supple seconded the motion.

Senator Doyle said that the wording seemed like it was only within the university, and that they did not support the initiative that RTC is giving. He explained that the wording simply made contradictions to what it was designed for, and what it sounds like.

Senator Ribeiro clarified Senator Doyle's statement.

Senator Harvey said nay.

The motion to amend carried.

Senator Doyle said he found the legislation very well done and well researched.

Speaker Murphy moved to a vote.

The legislation passed.

## **17. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS**

### **a. Senate Committee Changes**

Senator Taylor moved to remove himself from the committee on Academics and Student Affairs by unanimous consent.

The motion was carried.

### **b. Senator Reports**

The Senate will share progress they have made in ASUN-related activities that they have been working on.

Senator Supple asked the senate body if anyone wanted to assist her in writing a resolution on Sexual Assault Survivors statements made by Betsy Devos

Senator Torres said she was planning on writing legislation for additional blue lights around campus, and asked if anyone was interested in assisting her with writing the legislation.

Senator Supple said she believed Senator Doyle started working on this initiative last session.

Senator Doyle said he spoke to a representative at University PD, and that they stated blue lights are not used for their purpose because people have cellphones, and many universities are removing them. He said that reaching out to that representative again, would help bring clarification to the situation though.

Speaker Murphy also recommended reaching out to the Facilities department as well.

## **18. COMMENTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS**

Senator Keller said she wanted to applaud Senator Ribeiro in her initiative on having her constituents fill out the census.

**19. PUBLIC COMMENT**

Secretary Ugalde said that she had some messages from Legislative clerk Czerlanis and the secretaries office. She asked the senate body to please send any legislation to Bre, so that she can fulfill all of her duties. She also asked for committee chairs to please send all zoom meeting in for to their secretaries, or for Bre to forward to the secretaries. She said her last note was for any statements or reports read in meetings due to senator absences or other reasons, to also please be forwarded to the secretaries sitting in on their meetings so that it can be put on the record.

Dr. Rodriguez said that the south end of campus is completely different, and that a lot of buildings are gone. She said to know that when they came back it will be a different looking university.

**20. ADJOURNMENT**

Speaker Murphy adjourned the meeting at 7:05 pm.

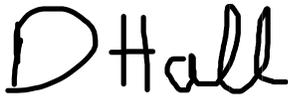

2**A Resolution in Support of Implementing Protected Bicycle Paths in Washoe County**

3           *Whereas*, the Regional Transportation Commission of Washoe County, Nevada (RTC) serves to  
4           “...provide leadership, vision, public policy development, and quality transportation systems through a  
5           commitment to excellence and pursuit of goals and objectives that meet the community’s present and  
6           future 4       needs”<sup>1</sup>;

7           *Whereas*, the RTC designs a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) every ten years;

8           *Whereas*, the 2050 Regional Transportation Plan builds upon the 2040 RTP, and will address,  
9           “...the

10          safety, mobility, connectivity and traffic-operating issues that are resulting from increased  
11          population and

12          employment growth in the region”<sup>1</sup>;

13          *Whereas*, the RTC is seeking input from Washoe County in order to, “...inspire, innovate and  
14          implement an integrated, efficient regional transportation system in our community,”;

11 *Whereas*, researchers at the University of New Mexico and the University of Colorado Denver

12 discovered that cities that had protected and separated bike lanes had 44 percent fewer

deaths than the 13 average city <sup>2</sup>;

14 *Whereas*, 2019 was one of the deadliest years for pedestrians in Washoe County, with rates up 100%

15 from 2018<sup>3</sup>;

16 *Whereas*, the Reno-Sparks pedestrian fatality rate in 2019 was nearly twice the national average  
and 12

17 percent higher than Nevada's statewide average<sup>4</sup>;

18 *Whereas*, protected bicycle paths would reduce pedestrian risk and improve safety for Washoe

County 19 citizens;

20 *Whereas*, the University of Portland found that cities that implemented protected bicycle

paths and/or 21 lanes saw a ridership increase from as little as 20 percent to as large as 170 percent<sup>5</sup>;

3 *Whereas*, the implementation of bicycle lanes and protected paths are less expensive than road

4 projects and construction, with a 2014 analysis of the cost comparison going as follows in a San

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budget study: “1 mile of basic protected bikeway was \$445,000 compared to 1 mile of Central Subway:

\$1,000,000,000, 1 mile of Doyle Drive: \$571,066,667 or 1 curb extension: \$78,000,”<sup>7</sup>;

*Whereas*, legislation from the 87<sup>th</sup> Session of the Associated Students of the University of Nevada,

Reno, titled, “A Resolution Advocating for the Installation of Street Lights on Evans Street and Enterprise

Road”, written by Senator Murphy and Senator Doyle, highlights student and civilian safety as a priority

issue<sup>8</sup>;

*Whereas*, the University aims to, “Create alternative transportation options for students to and from

campus,” in ASUN No Walls: 2025<sup>91011</sup>;

*Whereas*, the University of Nevada, Reno should support measures that increase alternative transportation options that incentivize students;

*Whereas*, other universities have supported similar pedestrian safety measures, such as Clemson

University, which earned its silver status in the League of American Bicyclists in their list of Bicycle Friendly

Universities for expanding bicycle lanes on campus<sup>11</sup>;

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18       *Whereas*, the University aims to, “Strengthen the social, economic, and environmental well-being of

19       people by engaging Nevada citizens, communities, and governments,” in the University’s Strategic Plan<sup>12</sup>;

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*Whereas*, the University of Nevada, Reno should support measures that promote the environmental well-being of both students and citizens of surrounding areas;

3           *Whereas*, the City of Reno has a Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan that references protected

4       bicycle paths as “Cycle Tracks”, prioritizes safety in the Plan’s RTP Guiding Principles, and explicitly

5       states the need for, “Physically separated bicycle lanes or wide curb lanes along arterials and collectors with

6       unobstructed sidewalks,” on page twenty-two of this master plan under the “COMMUTER AND

7       STUDENT DESTINATIONS AND NEEDS” subsection<sup>13</sup>;

8       *Whereas*, the City of Reno Master Plan states that, “Reno should implement an attractive and safe

9       bicycle system by expanding and improving the bikeway network and ensuring that new development

10       provides attractive and functional facilities at commercial and public destinations,”<sup>14</sup>;

11       *Whereas*, for the strategic plans of the University of Nevada, Reno and the City of Reno to come to

12       fruition, it is important that measures are taken to protect pedestrian safety;

13       *Be it resolved that*, the Senate of the Associated Students of the University of Nevada support a

14       proposition of implementing protected bicycle paths in the Regional Transportation Plan 2050;
