SUBMITTED BY SENATOR MURPHY, HUBER, MEZA, AND VELTRE TO THE SENATE OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS

A Resolution in Support of the \$85 per credit hour Differential Fee for the College of Business

- 1 Whereas, this past fall, the Business Student Council, members of ASUN clubs affiliated with the
- 2 College of Business, and the elected College of Business ASUN Senators were tasked with providing
- 3 input on a differential fee for the College of Business;
- 4 *Whereas,* differential tuition (fees) are an amount charged on top of base tuition to support
- 5 additional services and programming for students at a particular institution¹;
- 6 *Whereas,* this differential fee would be \$85 per credit hour on upper division business courses
- 7 paid by students taking upper division business courses;
- 8 *Whereas,* \$30 of which would go towards operations within the College of Business, such as new
- 9 professors and staff, new classes, and new instructional resources for business departments and

clubs, and \$55 of which would go towards the creation of a new business building with an unofficial

3	Whereas, the collective group of business students mentioned above, had multiple meetings
4	where the students were educated and allowed to give feedback on the proposed fee;
5	Whereas, with respect to the new business building, this collective group of students requested
6	that the following be added/ applied to the original construction design: 4 additional breakout/ study
7	rooms sized for 8 people for a total of 10 breakout rooms, 1 additional room at 750 sq. ft. to operate
8	a textbook library and business attire library, 1 additional case study room at 2080 sq. ft. for a total of
9	4 case study rooms, 2 additional flat classrooms at 1650 sq. ft. for a total of 6 classrooms, and no
10	reduction in common space, lobby space, and study areas currently at 4970 sq. ft.;
11	Whereas, the requests reflected above are in reference to the increasing programming needs of
12	the growing college, as the current business building is too small to meet the needs of the students
13	and staff and doesn't provide the resources for a valuable education;
14	Whereas, the College of Business has increased by about 700 students in less than 5 years,
15	making it one of the largest growing colleges on campus;
16	Whereas, the differential fee is recommended because the College of Business at the University is
17	growing too fast for the space currently occupied, and the instructional support and enhanced
18	environment provided by the fee will support the continued growth and success of the college;
19	Whereas, there were also multiple general meetings and emails sent out by the Dean's office
20	where College of Business undergraduate students were invited to be educated and to provide their
21	feedback and input on this proposed fee;
22	Whereas, there was overall support from these students who attended these general meetings;
23	Whereas, it is noted business students generally resented becoming the funding source of a new
24	business building, but with their recommendation, recognize the value this building will have for the
25	next 30 years and for the next generation of business students to get a tier one education at the

1 Be it resolved that, the Senate of the Associated Students of the University of Nevada support the 2 proposed \$85 per credit hour differential fee for the College of Business; 3 Be it further resolved that, the Associated Students support for this differential fee will be 4 withdrawn if the new building does not meet the programming/ size needs designated by the 5 Business Student Council, members of ASUN clubs affiliated with the College of Business, and the 6 elected College of Business ASUN Senators; 7 Be it further resolved that, the Associated Students support for this differential fee will be 8 withdrawn if annual accounting of this differential fee is not communicated to the Business Student 9 Council or if two student representatives are not invited to all future building meetings; 10 Be it further resolved that, the Associated Students of the University of Nevada encourage the 11 Board of Regents to vote in favor of this fee due to the mass amount of student support for this 12 project; 13 Be it further resolved that, a copy of this resolution be sent to President Marc Johnson, Dean 14 Mosier for the College of Business, and the Board of Regents for the Nevada System of Higher

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15 Education when the proposed fee is discussed at the Regents Meeting on March 5-6, 2020.
