A resolution in support to protect Thacker Pass

Whereas, the Lithium mine company named “Lithium America’s” is moving forward with final construction plans of a Lithium Mine in rural Nevada.

Whereas, “Lithium Americas” who possess an partnership with “Lithium Nevada Corp.” wish to use an open pit area project for the lithium mine.

Whereas, the open pit area project would require 17,933 acres of land to start, then expand the parameters of the open pit mine by 5,200 acres per year following.

Whereas, Lithium America plans to mine nearly 6,000 acres in Thacker Pass, Nevada, creating an open-pit roughly one-half mile across and 2.3 miles long, with associated tailings piles and processing facilities.

Whereas, Lithium is found in Peehee Mu'huh soil at 2000-9000 ppm (0.2-0.9%). Producing one ton of Lithium will require strip mining and processing between 110 and 500 tons of Earth.

Whereas, the Atsa Koodakuh Wyh Nuwu tribe, or “People of Red Mountain”, currently reside in their native land known as Peehee mu'huh, “Thacker Pass”.

Whereas, The Peehee Mu'huh area is the original home of Northern Paiute and Western Shoshone Natives for generations.

Whereas, Peehee Mu'huh is a holy land blessed by spirits, ancestors, and bald eagles- the animal manifestation of the Creator. In addition, the area is a resting ground of ancestral deaths from wars fought against White settlers.

Whereas, the Atsa Koodakuh Why Nuwu tribe uses Peehee Mu'huh to celebrate their culture, religion, tribe, and Creator.

Whereas, the Atsa Koodakuh Wyh Nuwu tribe uses the wildlife, water, and food as resources to maintain the Native tribe's essential needs.

Whereas, Much of the Peehee Mu’huh site is covered in old-growth big-sagebrush, with individuals over 100 years in age. This type of habitat is increasingly rare across Nevada.

Whereas, the wildlife that inhabits Peehee Mu’huh, such as jackrabbits, coyotes, groundhogs, mule deer, and golden eagles.

Whereas, the Atsa Koodakuh Wyh Nuwu tribe that continues to inhabit Peehee mu’huh, or “Thacker Pass,” will have their ancestral land confiscated from them to go towards the Lithium Mine. There are cultural sites, including obsidian processing areas and potentially burial sites, in the area directly surrounding the proposed mine

Whereas, the land of Peehee Mu’huh is in grave danger of pollution, contaminated water, losing their native ancestral land and resources to stay alive.

Whereas, the Peehee Mu’huh mine would burn around 11,300 gallons of diesel fuel per day for on-site operations and nearly as much again for off-site operations.

Whereas, Carbon emissions from the site would be more than 150,000 tons per year (during Phase 2), roughly 2.3 tons of carbon for every ton of Lithium produced.

Whereas, The mine could cause local springs to dry up and impact a critically endangered spring snail that only lives in the Thacker Pass area.

Whereas, declines in groundwater levels could cause meadows to become dustbowls and streams home to threatened Lahontan cutthroat trout to become increasingly inhospitable to fish.

Whereas, The Nevada Department of Wildlife has described the proposed mine as having “adverse impacts to wildlife, ground and surface waters, and riparian vegetation within and outside the project area. These impacts include effects to an array of species and will likely have permanent ramifications on the area’s wildlife and habitat resources.”

Be it resolved that, the Associated Students of the University of Nevada support the Atsa Koodakuh Wyh Nuwu tribe in their efforts to protect Peehee Mu’huh, primary resources, clean water, and food. The Associated Students of the University of Nevada oppose Lithium America’s decision to build a Lithium Mine on Peehee Mu’huh.

A Resolution to Raise the Minimum Wage for Student Workers

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA

A Resolution to Raise the Minimum Wage for Student Workers

Whereas, The MIT Living Wage calculator estimates that the living minimum wage for a single adult in Nevada is 13.67 dollars a hour;

Whereas, Many student jobs on campus pay less than the state minimum wage of 9.75 dollars a hour;

Whereas, Many student jobs only pay the Nevada student wage standard which is only 85% of state minimum for full-time college students;

Whereas, up to 15% of adults say they lost their jobs or were laid off due to COVID-19;

Whereas, There is a large labour shortage both across the country and in Nevada;

Whereas, Many students are concerned about the continuing impacts of COVID and low wages when returning to work;

Whereas, Many companies in Nevada have already increased wages and incentives to attract workers;

Whereas, Students are among the most vulnerable and financially insecure part of the population;

Whereas, A poll by College Reaction/Axios Poll found that 38% of students lost work due to COVID-19;

Whereas, College enrollment for undergraduates is down by over 5% nationwide and the number one reason people are unable to attend or drop out of college is financial issues;

Whereas, The State of Nevada has passed a bill increasing the state minimum wage by 75 cents annually until 2024;

Whereas, Every job on campus should strive to pay a fair wage and support students;

Whereas, Currently many jobs on campus do not meet even the state minimum wage;

Be it resolved that, ASUN urges the University to increase the minimum wage for student workers across campus to meet the state minimum wage at 9.75 and match the wage increase of 75 cents annually until 2024 to a wage of 11 and 12 dollars an hour for jobs offering qualifying health benefits and those not offering any qualifying health benefits respectively;

AN ACT TO AMEND THE STATUTES OF
THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS

1 *Whereas*, the Statutes of the Associated Students establishes the Office of the Secretary
2 of the Senate and outlines their duties;

3 *Whereas*, communication between the Secretary of the Senate and Committee Secretaries
4 is an integral function in the Senate of the Associated Students;

5 *Whereas*, the Secretary of the Senate will be required to hold regular meetings with
6 Committee Secretaries, to ensure that the line of communication remains open and consistent, as
7 outlined in Addendum A;

8 *Whereas*, the Legislative Clerk will be present at such regular meetings, in order to provide
9 information on the status of legislation and ensure no other problems arise, as outlined in
10 Addendum A;

11 *Whereas*, the Secretary of the Senate will be required to give a report during the meeting
12 of the Senate, in order to provide information on their meetings with Committee Secretaries and
13 whatever information they may deem necessary, as outlined in Addendum A;

14 *Whereas*, the keeping of a record of incomplete minutes is beneficial to the Office of the
15 Secretary of the Senate, so that any incomplete minutes are known and may thus be completed;

16 *Whereas*, the Secretary of the Senate will be required to keep a current record of
17 incomplete minutes to be completed as time allows, as outlined in Addendum A;

18 *Whereas*, in the absence of the Secretary of the Senate, as outlined in the SAS, the
19 Legislative Clerk must take over their duties;

20 *Whereas*, the role of Senior Secretary will be established in the Statutes of the Associated
21 Students, as outlined in Addendum A;

22 *Whereas*, Title I, Chapter 101, Section 9, Point 3 and 4 shall be removed from the
23 Statutes of the Associated Students, as outlined in Addendum A;

24 *Whereas*, the Senior Secretary will assume the duties of the Secretary of the Senate if the
25 Secretary of the Senate is absent or if there is a vacancy, and the Legislative Clerk will no longer be
26 responsible for this, as outlined in Addendum A;

27 *Be it enacted that*, the changes in Addendum A will be reflected in the Statutes of the
28 Associated Students.

ADDENDUM A

STATUTES OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS

TITLE I: THE LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

CHAPTER 101: COMPOSITION

SECTION 01: COMPOSITION

The Legislative Branch is composed of the Speaker of the Senate and twenty-two elected Senators which includes Chairs of Committees, Vice Chairs of Committees, the Parliamentarian and the Speaker Pro Tempore with the assistance of the Legislative interns, the Secretary of the Senate, the Legislative Clerk(s) and Committee Secretaries.

SECTION 02: SPEAKER OF THE SENATE

a) IN GENERAL:

The Senate shall elect from its membership a Speaker of the Senate who shall act as Chair of the Senate and the Committee on Oversight.

DUTIES:

The duties of the Speaker of the Senate include, but are not limited to:

- 1) Manage the Office of the Secretary.
- 2) Act as the signing authority for all accounts under control of the Senate.
- 3) Administer oaths and affirmations that are or may be required by the Constitution, or by law, to be taken by any Senator, officer of the Senate, witness, or other person in respect to any matter within the jurisdiction of the Senate.
- 4) Call meetings of the Senate as stated by law.
- 5) Produce the agenda for any given meeting of the Senate and give proper time for officer reports, committee reports and items of business. 6) Direct the Senate to maintain proper decorum during meeting
- 7) Manage Senator resignations and place the announcement of such resignations on the agenda.
- 8) Publicize and, at minimum, place advertisement in the Nevada Sagebrush for vacant Legislative positions.
- 9) Vote in matters of business where the speaker's vote would be decisive.
- 10) Sign all Acts of the Senate within Constitutional time limit.
- 11) Ensure Senate is following Nevada Open Meeting Law
- 12) Determine the quality of paper on which to print enrolled bills.
- 13) Email any legislation originally introduced within Senate or the Committee on Oversight to the Legislative Clerk(s) within 24 hours of posting the agenda.
- 14) Act as President if, by reason of death, resignation, removal from office, inability, or failure to qualify, there is neither a President nor Vice President to discharge the powers and duties of the office of President.

- 15) To serve as a member of the University Leadership Alliance.

SECTION 03: SENATORS

a) IN GENERAL:

A Senator, elected by peers in the college of the senator's major, serves a broad set of functions within the Association. However, the primary role of the Senator is that of legislator, amending and generating bills and resolutions which best reflect the needs and voices of the students during the Senators term as Senator. Senators must maintain a GPA consistent with the requirements of the Constitution, from an institution of higher education.

DUTIES:

The Senator is in the prime position to communicate between students and heads of colleges. The duties of the Senator include, but are not limited to:

- 1) Host four office hours within a two-week period
- 2) Regularly attend the entirety of the convening of the Senate and its committees to which the Senator has been assigned. Inability to attend the entirety of Senate meetings on a weekly basis will result in disqualification from the Office of Senator. In the instance of disqualification, a Senator shall resign from Office.
- 3) Report during committee meetings to which the senator is assigned with respect to the Senators activities as the previous meeting, whenever the chair of the committee requests.
- 4) Mentor and educate Legislative Intern(s) that may be assigned to them in concurrence with the standards proposed by the Speaker Pro Tempore and approved by the Senate body for that session.
- 5) Regularly attend meetings of the Student Advisory Board of the college which the officers are representing or take initiative regarding an inactive or nonexistent advisory board
- 6) Regularly attend meeting of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee of the college which the officers are representing or take initiative regarding an inactive or nonexistent diversity committee.
- 7) Below are the minimum attendance requirements expected from a senator for the above duties outlined in Title 1, Section 03, B lines five and six, but officers can serve any additional time at their discretion:
 - a) Senators are only required to sit on half of the semesterly meetings for each group (SAB and DEI boards).
 - b) For colleges that only have one senator, that senator is expected to meet a quarter of semesterly scheduled meetings, so long as they are regularly attending their diversity committee meetings and their student advisory meetings.
 - c) For unique scheduling circumstances, the expected attendance of the senator will be at the discretion of the Speaker of the Senate.
 - d) Any senator has the option to satisfy all of their attendance requirements by being a member of just one board or committee, but must be permitted by the Speaker to do so. Only strenuous scheduling circumstances are recommended to be permitted and the senator is

expected to collaborate with fellow senators of their college on the information they learn in their role as a member.

SECTION 04: CHAIRS OF COMMITTEES

a) IN GENERAL:

One Senator shall be elected to the position of chair per committee of the Senate; any individual Senator who is not the Speaker may not chair more than one committee.

DUTIES:

The duties of the Chairs of Committees include, but are not limited to, the following: 1) Write agendas which reflect the intentions and projects of the Committee;

- 2) Sit on the Committee on Oversight; and
- 3) Deliver a report of the proceedings to their respective Committee during the weekly meeting of the Senate which will include highlights of Senators, topics considered, public comment, and results of interviews and audits performed in committee
- 4) Email any legislation originally introduced within the chairs committee(s) to the Legislative Clerk(s) within 24 hours of posting the agenda.

SECTION 05: VICE-CHAIRS OF COMMITTEES

a) IN GENERAL:

A vice chair is elected by each committee to serve as a substitute for the chairperson in the chairs absence.

DUTIES:

The duties of the Vice Chairs of Committees include, but are not limited to the following:

- 1) Assume the responsibility of the Chair person in the chairs absence.
- 2) Draft Minutes in the absence of a committee secretary.
- 3) In the absence of a Secretary at a committee meeting, distribute paper or electronic copies in a manner equivalent to the staff secretary and perform all other duties determined to be necessary by the presiding officer and the Office of the Secretary of the Senate

SECTION 06: SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE

a) IN GENERAL:

The Senate shall appoint from the membership of the Senate a Speaker Pro Tempore, subject to the majority approval of the Senate. The Speaker Pro Tempore will adopt the duties of the Speaker of the Senate when appropriate, serving at the discretion of the Speaker of the Senate.

DUTIES:

The duties of the Speaker Pro Tempore include, but are not limited to the following:

- 1) Run weekly meetings of the full-body Senate when the Speaker is not present
- 2) In the case of illness, leave, or omitted to make such an appointment of the Speaker, the Speaker Pro Tempore may perform the duties of the Speaker for a period not exceeding 14 days, subject to the approval of the Senate.
- 3) In the case of a vacancy in the Office of Speaker, the Speaker Pro Tempore shall act as Speaker until the election of a new Speaker. Pending such election

- the Speaker Pro Tempore may exercise such authorities of the Office of Speaker as may be necessary and appropriate to that end.
- 4) Sit on the Senate Standing Committee on Oversight, as a full member of the Committee on Oversight. The Speaker Pro Tempore shall report on the legislative internship program.
 - 5) Will serve as oversight and liaison to the Legislative Interns.
 - 6) Coordinate the application and resignation process of the legislative interns and meet regularly with the Chair of the Legislative Interns to advise on planning of Legislative Intern meetings during the Fall semester.
 - 7) Plan, organize, and execute the curriculum of the Legislative Internship program with the aid of the Legislative Chair to include, but not be limited to:
 - i) Produce the education components each week to include sentiments such as: Robert's Rules of Order, the ASUN governing documents, the current Rules of the Senate, the Nevada Open Meeting Law, functions of the Standing Committee, Nevada State and federal laws and policies, writing procedures for legislation, time management, leadership development and research skills
 - ii) Presentations or guest speakers that increase the learning mission of the program.
 - iii) Hold events where Legislative Interns are able to meet current Senators.
 - iv) Coordinate a "buddy system" where Senators are matched to mentor and educate Legislative Intern(s).
 - 8) Review candidates for the Legislative Internships for eligibility with the assistance of the administrative faculty of the Center for Student Engagement.
 - 9) Develop a standard for the Senators to follow during the mentorship of the assigned interns. This standard shall be proposed by the Speaker Pro Tempore and must be passed by majority approval of the Senate. The standard shall include, but is not limited to:
 - i) A minimum number of hours the Senator shall spend with the assigned interns on a two-week time cycle
 - ii) A method Senators shall use to document the time the Senator spends with an intern.
 - iii) Develop a system of demerits for instances when senators fail to fulfill these obligations.
 - 10) Report on the senators' compliance with the duties and standards approved by the senate body
 - 11) Responsible for the curation of the Senate Legacy Box and all files within it. These files shall provide proper documentation for future senators.

SECTION 07: PARLIAMENTARIAN

The Speaker shall appoint from the membership of the Senate a Parliamentarian, subject to the majority approval of the Senate, who shall advise the Speaker and individual Senators on matters of Senate procedure, the law and the Constitution of the Associated Students. The Parliamentarian shall be informally trained along with or by the Attorney General of the Association within 14 days of assuming office, and shall informally train officers and department directors on parliamentarian procedures. The Parliamentarian shall assume a voting position within the Committee of Oversight. The Parliamentarian

shall, in the absence of the Secretary or inability of the Secretary to discharge the Secretary's duties, make a roll of the Senators-elect before the first meeting of the following session of the Senate and place thereon the names of those persons, and of such persons only, whose credentials show that the Parliamentarian were regularly elected in accordance with the laws of the Associated Students.

SECTION 08: SECRETARY OF THE SENATE

a) ESTABLISHMENT:

There is hereby established the position of Secretary of the Senate. The Secretary of the Senate shall be hired by the Speaker of the Senate with input from professional staff.

DUTIES:

- 1) Send to the Center for Student Engagement Staff a certificate of the number of Senators to which a college or school is entitled within fifteen calendar days after the receipt of the President's statement regarding the whole number of persons in each college and school, and the number of Representatives to which each college and school, and the number of the then existing number of Senators.
- 2) Make a roll of the Senators-elect before the first meeting of the following session of the Senate and place thereon the names of those persons, and of such persons only, whose credentials show that Senators were regularly elected in accordance with the laws of the Associated Students.
- 3) At the commencement of each session of the Senate, call the Senators to order and proceed to record their presence by Colleges or Schools in alphabetical order, by call of the roll.
- 4) Pending the election of a Speaker, preserve order and decorum and decide all questions of order, subject to appeal by a Senator.
- 5) Announce to the Senate the existence of any vacancies at the time of its assembly, due to resignation or otherwise.
- 6) Prepare for the agenda for the first Senate meeting of the following session according to Title I.102.4.a.
- 7) Recognize Speaker nominees to deliver a 10 minute presentation to the Senate and to put the question of the election of the Speaker by roll call vote at the conclusion of a debate regarding the election of the Speaker.
- 8) Present bills signed by the presiding officer of the Senate to the President, or such other person in the Office of the President as the President may designate by written instrument, in person and note in a journal the date and time of presentment of enrolled bills and the official who received the enrolled bill.
- 9) Upon the return of a bill by the President, note in a journal the date and time of the return of a bill.
- 10) Certify to the Center for Student Engagement Staff the text of an amendment to the Constitution of the Associated Students proposed by the Senate.
- 11) Note in a journal the date and time of the receipt of a nomination to the Senate.
- 12) Whenever the Senate grants its consent to a nomination, the Secretary shall cause to be sent to the appointing authority a resolution of proper form attesting to the Senate's consent to the nomination.
- 13) Cause the oath of office to be printed, furnishing two copies to each Senator

who has taken the oath of office in accordance with law, which shall be subscribed in person by the Senator, who shall thereupon deliver them to the Secretary, one to be filed in the records of the Senate, and the other to be recorded in the Journal or the Minutes of the Senate.

- 14) Administer the provisions of Title IX.901 with respect to the Senate and its committees.
- 15) Acting jointly with the Archives of the Associated Students, be the custodian of documents, and to make arrangements with the committee secretary for the proper filing of all records with the Archives of the Associated Students.
- 16) Act as the chair of the meeting of the convening of the Senate, and act as the Parliamentary authority during the election of a Speaker at said meeting.
- 17) Enroll all bills and present them to the proper parties with certification after the Senate has passed them.
- 18) Maintain office hours and attendance for all Senators, as to provide record for Rules violations, and ensure that, of the two weekly required hours, one takes place at the Senate table.
- 19) To administer any oath or affirmation required by law, or by the rules of the Senate, to be taken by any officer of the Senate and to any witness produced before it.
- 20) Ensure accurate, verbatim as necessary, minutes be recorded and documented, both in text and audio format, for all meetings of the Senate and meetings of the Committees of the Senate, as to abide by Nevada Open Meeting Law.
- 21) Monitor Senate meeting attendance as to ascertain and keep a proper quorum.
- 22) Ensure the availability of drafts of minutes and bills for all appropriate persons.
- 23) Oversee the production of minutes to be completed by the Administrative Assistants and oversee all matters relating to their office
- 24) Hold regular meetings with committee secretaries, the Legislative Clerk, and the Senior Secretary
- 25) Keep a record of incomplete minutes

SECTION 09: LEGISLATIVE CLERK

a) ESTABLISHMENT:

There is hereby established the positions of Legislative Clerk. One (1) Legislative Clerk may be hired by the Speaker of the Senate with input from the Secretary of the Senate and professional staff.” DUTIES:

The duties of the Legislative Clerk shall include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1) Compile, edit and maintain the Public Laws, Resolutions and Statutes-at-Large and Statutes of the Associated Students in accordance with the laws governing such in conjunction with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2) Organize in chronological order, bind and index the following:
 - i) Agendas and minutes of all public bodies meeting within the ASUN Student Government, including: the ASUN Senate, Senate Committees, Association Elections, Department of Programming, Executive Cabinet, Department of Legislative Affairs, and Clubs and Organizations Commission.

- ii) Records of ASUN Judicial Council cases and opinions including: copies of charge sheets, written briefs and documents used in each case, and final judgments of the Council; and
 - iii) Copies of the annual budgets of the ASUN and any related and clarifying budget material.
- 3) Assist the Secretary of the Senate with the enrollment of Public Laws and Resolutions of the Associated Students. ~~In the event of vacancy or incapacity of the Secretary of the Senate, the Legislative Clerk shall assume the powers and duties of the Secretary.~~
 - ~~4) In the absence of the Secretary or inability of the Secretary to discharge the Secretary's duties, send to the Center for Student Engagement Staff a certificate of the number of senators to which a college or school is entitled within fifteen calendar days after the receipt of the President's statement regarding the whole number of persons in each college and school, and the number of Representatives to which each college and school, and the number of the then-existing number of Senators.~~
 - 5) Endorse by stamp the date enrolled bills are received from the President or the Senate in the right-hand margin of the first page.
 - 6) Receive approved bills and carefully preserve the originals.
 - 7) Assign to each bill a unique serial number (Senate session—serial number) in the order in which it was submitted to the Legislative Clerk for introduction.
 - 8) Keep a running document of the numbering of bills and resolutions for the Speaker and all Committee Chairs to see at any given time, and edit when adding legislation, so that the Legislative Clerk may assign any legislation originally submitted to a committee its own serial number.
 - 9) Whenever official notice is received at the appropriate office that any amendment proposed to the Constitution of the Associated Students has been adopted, according to the provisions of the Constitution, cause the amendment to be published, with the legislative clerk's certificate, specifying the vote by which the same may have been adopted by both the students and the Board of Regents of the Nevada System of Higher Education, and that the same has become valid, to all intents and purposes, as a part of the Constitution of the Associated Students.
 - 10) Cause to be compiled, edited, indexed, and published, the Associated Students Statutes at Large, which shall contain all the laws and resolutions enacted during each regular session of the Senate; all proclamations by the President in the numbered series issued since the date of the adjournment of the regular session of the Senate next preceding; and also any amendments to the Constitution of the Associated Students proposed or ratified since that date, together with the certificate of the Legislative Clerk of the Associated Students issued in compliance with the provision contained in Title I.103.12.
 - 11) In the event of an extra session of the Senate, cause all the laws and resolutions enacted during said extra session to be consolidated with, and published as part of, the contents of the volume for the next regular session, unless such special session was held during a regular session or within one month of the regular session next preceding.

- 12) Administer the provisions of Title IX.901 with respect to all documents kept in the Legislative Clerk's custody, and any other public bodies of the Associated Students.
- 13) Keep in the custody the seal of the Associated Students and to affix the seal to commissions, proclamations by the President, promulgation instruments of ratified amendments to the Constitution, and such other documents or instruments as the Legislative Clerk may determine require the affixal of the seal.
- 14) Manage and compile the Archives of the Associated Students (or ASUN Archives) with the Office of the Secretary.
- 15) Evaluate all records, documents, reports, and other potential archival material in the ASUN before it is discarded.
- 16) Designate a staff member of the ASUN Administration, after consultation with the President and Director of ASUN, along with such other staff assistance as may be needed for compiling and maintaining the Archives.
- 17) Prepare and present to the Senate each year both a report on the progress of the Archives and budget requests for Archive funding.

SECTION 10: SENIOR SECRETARY

a) ESTABLISHMENT:

There is hereby established the position of Senior Secretary. The Senior Secretary shall be hired or promoted by the Speaker of the Senate with input from the Secretary of the Senate and professional staff.

DUTIES:

The duties of the Senior Secretary shall include but are not limited to the following:

- 1) In the event of vacancy or incapacity of the Secretary of the Senate, the Senior Secretary shall assume the powers and duties of the Secretary
- 2) In the absence of the Secretary or inability of the Secretary to discharge the Secretary's duties, send to the Center for Student Engagement Staff a certificate of the number of senators to which a college or school is entitled within fifteen calendar days after the receipt of the President's statement regarding the whole number of persons in each college and school, and the number of Representatives to which each college and school, and the number of the then existing number of Senators

SECTION ~~10~~ 11: ASUN SECRETARIES

a) ESTABLISHMENT:

There is hereby established the positions of ASUN Secretaries. The ASUN Secretaries shall be hired by the Speaker of the Senate with input from the Secretary of the Senate and professional staff.

DUTIES:

The duties of the ASUN Secretaries shall include but are not limited to the following:

- 1) Assist the Secretary of the Senate in all matters concerning the Senate Committees, Executive, and Judicial meetings.
- 2) Attend and transcribe the minutes of the Senate Committees, Executive, and Judicial meetings.

- 3) Assist the Secretary of the Senate in tracking attendance during Senate Committees, executive, and judicial meetings.
- 4) Ensure the Senate Committees, Executive, and Judicial meetings abide by the standing rules of order.
- 5) Abide by Nevada Open Meeting Law with respect to NRS 241.035 and provide printed versions of the agenda for the public.
- 6) Preside during Senate meetings if instructed to do so by the Secretary of the Senate.
- 7) Provide the Secretary with copies of drafts and approved minutes.
- 8) Assist in assembling a book of minutes for the body, which shall contain the original records listed below for each meeting in the following order:
- 9) The agenda:
 - i) Supporting material to the agenda
 - ii) The approved minutes
 - iii) The exhibits to the minutes
 - iv) Miscellaneous material
- 10) Shall record each meeting for the public.
- 11) Work jointly with the Secretary of Senate of the Associated Students to appropriately file each recording.

SECTION ~~11~~ 12: APPORTIONMENT

The seats in the Senate shall be apportioned among the colleges as follows:

- a) College of Agriculture, Biotechnology, and Natural Resources: two (2)
- b) College of Business: four (4)
- c) College of Education: two (2)
- d) College of Engineering: three (3)
- e) College of Liberal Arts: five (5)
- f) College of Science: four (4)
- g) Community Health Sciences/Orvis School of Nursing: three (3)
- h) Reynolds School of Journalism: one (1)
- i) Division of Health Sciences/School of Medicine (Speech Pathology, Social Work: one (1)

SECTION ~~12~~ 13: REAPPORTIONMENT OF SENATORS

a) On the first day of December, or within one week thereafter, of the Seventy-Ninth session of the Senate and of each Senate thereafter, the President shall transmit to the Senate a statement showing the whole number of persons in each college and school, and the number of Representatives to which each college and school would be entitled under an apportionment of the then existing number of Senators. The apportionment method used shall be the Huntington Hill Method of Equal Proportions, whereby each seat is designated in sequence to the college with the highest priority value in descending order. Each college shall be charted on a horizontal axis and the row number on the vertical axis. The priority value (q) is determined by dividing the population of the college (p) by the square root of (n-1)(n), "n" being equal to the row number in question. For the first

row, each college will approach infinite priority and each will be granted one seat: $q = p / [(n-1)^*(n)^{(1/2)}]$ $q = p / [(1-1)^*(1)^{(1/2)}] = p / (0*1)^{(1/2)} = p / 0 = \infty$ The priority value of the fourth row, for example, will be determined as follows: 1) $q = p / [(n1)^*(n)^{(1/2)}]$ 2) $q = p / [(4-1)^*(4)^{(1/2)}] = (3*4)^{(1/2)} = 12^{(1/2)}$ 3) $q = p / 3.464101\dots$ One seat shall be granted to the college with the highest priority value, the next seat to the next highest priority value, and so on until each Senate seat is designated to a college.

b) Each college and school shall be entitled, in the Eightieth and in each Senate thereafter until the taking effect of a reapportionment under this section or subsequent statute, to the number of Senators shown in the statement required by subsection (a) of this section, no college or school to receive less than one Senator. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Senate, within fifteen calendar days after the receipt of such statement, to send to the Center for Student Engagement Staff a certificate of the number of Senators to which such college or school is entitled under this section. In case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary, or the Secretary's absence or inability to discharge this duty, then such duty shall devolve on the Legislative Clerk.

c) The basis of apportionment figures shall be the enrollment headcount of undergraduate students in each college and school that is not an administrative unit of another college or school as of the University census date for the fall semester next preceding reapportionment. The headcount shall accurately reflect actual membership in the Association, in accordance with the Constitution
