Subpoint A: Financial review schedule 2025

-Chair Miceli introduced the financial review schedule for the 2025 term; this is a draft similar to the one used last year.

-Chair Miceli asked if this works for everyone, Hoang, Kuster, Moss all mentioned this would work for them

-Chair Miceli asked Director Rodriguez if there was a reason NSI (New Student Initiatives), Event Programming and Executive Board Etc. all together. Director Rodriguez explained that we should not do them too early as there would be nothing spent, 0 expenses.

-Chair Miceli asked Director Rodriguez the difference between the Concert account and Programming account, Director Rodriguez explained for transparency, it may be best to separate the accounts, but they are both under the Director of Event Programming, Rilyn Krentz.

-Chair Miceli went back to discuss availability for the dates of the Financial Reviews for Fall 2025, mentioned he will send it in the team's chat. Rooms have already been booked.

#### Subpoint B: Data Collection Discussion

-Chair Miceli mentioned a process to systemize the collected data from these reviews and throw everything into a report at the end of the semester and year, being able to present it to the next President and Vice President of the association, helping build the budget for the future. Maybe even sending a questionnaire to better structure the meetings

-Chair Miceli asked for everyone's thoughts

-Senator Barrus likes the idea of having a report at the end of the year, and maybe even suggesting some kind of recommendation of what spending could look like in the future as well as what they are doing well already regarding spending the budget. And then we can also factor in attendance and what students are interested in when it comes to events and initiatives. So like what students are kind of drawn to when it comes to student events or initiatives and what is being offered for the students, and then we could take notes and collect numbers of what departments are spending their money on, so this could be like food, activities or merch or some kind, and then we could do this by suggesting before their financial review, they can send an itemized budget, like what they spent at each little event. They already do that when they pass their budgets through their public meetings, but having that itemized budget going into budget

finance, it kind of helps already look and see what money is being spent directly and also promotes more transparency if we add it to the budget in finance agenda in the future.

-Director Rodriguez asked if the body wrote up a bill and passed an official budget request, so it asks you how much the average cost you. But not everybody's doing that, but it would be nice if budget and finance created a law and said, from here on out, you're going to do that. So, exec board, Idea, everybody would have to use the standard budget form, and then you could literally grab the data from that.

-Chair Miceli asked what should be included in the budget form?

-Director Rodriguez directed the committee to what the current programming board does, and what their budget form looks like. If an official one passed, all the departments could use the same form, and standardized data can be pulled from that.

-Chair Miceli: asked if that would have to be legislation

-Director Rodriguez: You would write up a bill and say, everybody who is in a body, spending money must officially use this budget so that we can gather data.

-Senator Barrus: So, just a little clarification, like, are you suggesting we kind of dropped a bill to have like an official form that they could fill out that says specifically like what their event is, like specifically to what event programming does because I'm familiar with a little bit about the process.

-Director Rodriguez: have them forward that budget to this committee and you all start gathering data. Okay. Do you see what I'm saying? So, then it's standardized data across the board.

-Chair Miceli: Okay, I think I understand. So, we're just within our own account. We want them to have a standardized budget to fill out and send it to us. Do you want that to be the same thing, or do you think that it should be the same thing as the questionnaire we sent out before the financial reviews? Should we just be looking at that, or is it worth it to have two different opinions?

-Director Rodriguez: That's up to you, but you guys can have a discussion about it. And I will tell you this, the programs and services are different. It's just going to be tires and oil, and you know what I'm saying for pack rides? They don't pass budgets, but the control you have over them is that they can't just take money and spend it on something random, right? That's why you guys do budget reviews. But for all the ASUN, like the government accounts, absolutely. And right now, you all are missing the data. I got a lot of data. On the programs and services site, right? We don't have any data when it comes to the government side of things.

-Senator Kuster: Okay. So That sounds me. Just play with it. Yeah, so just like questions, I' being a new senator or just to clarify. So arg to kind of going to go over existing budgets and kind of do feedback on then? Where is our goal who works health buds develop these budgets and create health free, where the money the allocated?

-Director Rodriguez: Your goal would be to collect all these budgets, gather the data, and do an end of semester report. By the end of fall, 2025, we learned that, right? Mm hmm. Yeah, if you open up, like I said, you open up the. Sorry. Yeah, go to government, then scroll down to meetings. Keep going public meetings. Click on that, and then go to the programming board. H Hit their agenda. Sidension, you to? Yes, of course. Let me do that. It's got, like, a mirrored screen and a mirror screen screen. And so if you scroll down, the program board has always done this. They've always had an official budget, right? The budget serves their need. What is the need of the budget and finance committee? What kind of information do you need? And so if you'll notice, they'll give you a breakdown, like costs for student, where the event is taking place. Is there anything else ident finance committee would want to learn about every budget that gets approved? Right? And so that's a great way for you to gather data.

-Chair Miceli: And so is programming the only ones who actually create something like this or does every department?

-Senator Barrus: I think that there definitely is a template in the box, but I think that each department kind of changes it a little bit. I know the executive, so the president's cabinet does it a little differently. The idea does it a little differently, but it's all based off kind of like the similar template. But I think that if we pass that legislation to Hav it, be all pretty similar, and all has the same data that we want to collect out of it, I think it becomes more of like a standardized practice

-Director Rodriguez: Like, right there, it says, expected attendance, then part of the bill will be after your event, you have to go in and upload the actual's gonna. And then the actual amount spent. And so then you can start comparing the data of the foreign and after as a budget finance company, you should be interested in that.

-Senator McAndrews: So then, I would say, like, if we do write a bill, then maybe it's not necessarily, like, including anything when they do the financial, like report at the beginning, but maybe it's like just the data they have in the like after the event. Because maybe they ran out of things or maybe they bought too many things or, you know what I mean? Like, I think at the end of the day, the main goal is to see how many students were actually facing at the end of the day.

-Senator Kuster: I agree, but I think it's also important to recognize what, you know, where the ones are you spending the property, because of the other's concern about a group that's consistently overspending. I think that's something we also want to know. Like, if they're requesting \$200 and using a certain amount, I think we also want to see, like, which committees are using money for this and that, and I think it's really important to see what's overspent as well.

-Director Rodriguez: I would say equally important is organizations that are underspending, which is actually happening more than the overspending. And Jared is already doing part of this work for you in the clubs and Oen, so you don't have to worry about the club funding, but right now, what's happening is that there's a lot of row over. So though they may budget, but not use the money, but then if they're not using it, it forces the organization to reconcile as soon as possible to put the unused dollars back, right? So that they can spend. Instead, it just hangs out there.

-Chair Miceli: Right. And that's sort of like what we talked about last week.

-Director Rodriguez: People get accustomed to having that rollover, and it's not really reflective of what the financial situation is. If they're building their budget off of that, right? Jan, I don't recommend to this body. I don't think it's something you should visit every time. I think you should do the financial reviews. Maybe your last meeting is actually spent compiling the data and presenting a report. that you can present to the Senate at the beginning of the spring semester, saying, here's how the financial is actually worked out.. Proposed and then actual.

-Chair Miceli: Has something like that ever been done before, where there's a reported to the Senate or No.

-Director Rodriguez: No, I think it's the programming board comes the closest because they do have to keep track of their money. Yeah. Right? They need to know, okay, what didn't we spend? But, yeah, I mean, I think equally import this cost for student, estimated attendance versus the actual lieendance. If you're up to you're doing a program and you're thinking you're gonna get 3,000 people and you're getting 50, that that essentially grounds for the Seven to come back and say, Mbe it's time to put this program to rest."

-Senator McAndrews: My concern about, like, the end of end of event report is like, how are we actually going to get those numbers of actual attendance? I feel like it's a little blurry, right? Because if we make it hard for the students to like attend or like have extra steps, they're going to be less likely to enjoy the things that we put on. But then as a director or people who

work the event, like, is someone going to be counting them? Like, I don't know. What are your guys' thoughts?

-Senator Barrus: So, um usually a lot of our ASUN events, we use the Pac Life check-in, we lose like a little QR code, and then it's called campus Labs. We scan the QR code and check in each suit. Or they could type in their first last name or email and it kind of checks them in manually. Of course, sometimes like, students, you know, pass the check-in booth and they get sipped up. But I think a lot of people also count. If I remember correctly, they have, look at a handheld counter and they counter just watch people walk in and count. As they're doing if it's indoor, it's a little difficult outdoors, but I think that is usually the process that departments usually go through. And I've heard it's been pretty successful. outside of programming as well.

-Director Rodriguez: If a law was passed, they got to figure out how to do it. And it's in their best interests that they do it. The Joe, by the way, will have employees and in the door, and you're walking in and they're clicking. And then they're happy to give you the cap. I think you're talking about events like out Casey M. I guarantee you that it yes, my security is there, handy can give you an almost to the number estimate. This guy's been doing large scale events forever. So club fair, he will give you an estimate that is super close to the number. I think those are the events, right? They get harder to count, but, yeah, I think we have enough expertise to arrive at that effort.

-Senator Kuster: Yeah, and I also agree that that's what I was going to say, but I think that even justated in large events a rough and I think can be helpful. And I did have a question I was wondering if you could get a copy of the report on the programming as a relief kind of look over what they report on what data they're likeing if we can decide that this is something that we want to put into a bill or what we think is necessary, we can translate to our bill that they might be pretty.

-Chair Miceli: Yeah, are you referring to the one that I have pulled up?

-Senator Kuster says yes

-Chair Miceli says he will pull it up and send it to the teams chat as well.

-Director Rodriguez: Then again, ou can add more things if you think they're viable. The programming board's been using the form forever. They use it for their needs, right? That doesn't mean that the body, the senate body can say, actually, we need additional information from you. We're not gonna get in the way of you approving or disapproving your own budget, but we expect data, right? When you do pass a budget and this is the data we'll requesting for.

-Chair Miceli: Said committee can work on this during the summer, If we work on that and if that's a way of standardizing the budgets that each account fills out, then I don't know if it is even will have that information. And so I don't think the form that they would be required to fill up before a financial review would even be necessary at that point. Because we're tailoring this to our needs, like you mentioned. So if all of our needs are in that budget that they can fill out, then I think we can interpret the data from there.

-Director Rodriguez: Yeah, at the end of each semester. But during your, you're still living to the regular financial.

-Chair Miceli: yeah, I was just imagining before the review, we send a form or, you know, something for the account to fill out, that provides us information going into the meeting. I see that this budget, if it's required to fill out at the beginning of the semester, at least initially, because they can't update the event stats until the event happens, but that would be serve the purpose of that.

-Director Rodriguez: After this, we don't have to problem sol this. I want to talk to Aaron. I wondering if there's a way we can fill out these budgets online so that we capture the data in on some format like Excel, which means then we can extract the data, right? So that you all aren't having to go back in and do all this data entry after the fact. Right. So let me talk to. I know I can tell you that he's been playing with the budget requests on PLife, which actually is meant to do this. The original budget, the we' focus on clubs and orgs submitting budget requests. So if clubs and orgs can do an impact life, why could the program before do the impact life? You still have to upload something onto an agenda because it's necessary for Nevada at the law, but I don't want to see you all spending hours inputting data of it after the fact that would be a nightmare. But like I said, we can problem solve that with there and after.

-Senator McAndrews: 'm curious, like logistically, who would be the person from each, like, department uploading the end of event reports?

-Chair Miceli: Asked if he can refer to Director Rodriguez

-Director Rodriguez: Stated And again, that, would be the problem the programming board would have to figure that out. The executive board would have to figure that out. Me, I think positions already exist. There's already an idea of budgets, right? There's already an AD of budgets for the clubs and Horn court. They can create one of the positions an idea can take that on. So I go back to you're the Senate, you tell them, this is how you're going to do it, they go back and they figure out how they're going to do it. I don't think you're not asking for anything

impossible. It's not anything that's not already interwoven in some parts of AU and government. What's point? So that could be part of your bill. You will designate someone.

- Senator McAndrews: Asked if each department has the responsibility of assigning someone

-Director Rodriguez nodded in agreement, then stated But then I also don't want to be harsh at them. That's why I want to go talk to Aaron after this. How can we make it easier for them to send their budget so that, you know, maybe that data just transfers over when you do that before and after

-Chair Miceli: nd how do you, I mean, these financial reviews, are we gonna be. Is the focus gonna shift? I mean, how do they typically look, and is this gonna change anything? If we're comparing to their budget? Who has that budget wouldn't be enough before? Chair Miceli referred to Senator Hoang

-Senator Hoang: eah, so, how they went in the past, normally what would happen was, the chair would call in some representative from whatever department we reviewing. They'd come in, they'd give a presentation, they'd probably prepare some sort of memo, explaining how they spent their money, and then we talk about how they spent that together and then we'd also asked them many questions if we had any, and then they would also sometimes talk about what they planned to do with their funds in the future, and then we sometimes question them on that. I'm not sure how this would affect all this. I think it maybe just help us understand a little better what exactly they're doing and just maybe give us more numbers and more statistics. And also think it would help maybe guide the conversation. I know last session, sometimes we would just not have any questions or we'd just be like, all right, that's that sounds good. So I think this is a good start, but yeah, just like to hear the conversation as it falls, but there's that.

-Chair Miceli asked Senator Hoang what questions were normally come up during these financial reviews

-Senator Hoang: t would I think something that we had brought up, it was maybe, like, a, why are you guys spending all this money on the orientation, right events? Or like, why do you guys want to spend money here? Or. I can't think of the exact scen areas, but I do remember it's just like, sometimes we talk about how much money is being spent here or we'd ask, okay, how many people are you guys affecting? But honestly, most things would be explained through the memos that they give us and the presentations that they have. So again, like, I feel like most of



the time we normally just didn't have that many conversations or that many questions if we had any at all.

-Senator Barrus added: Senator Hoang had an accurate description as someone who has sat on the committee in the past, on the executive side of things when we did get some of our email to do the finance tour reviews. It was when I was the idea of budget for event program, I'm just going to drag in my experience there. I was just told to kind of bring any relevant information to the table, so I just made sure to touch every single itemized budget that we did for whatever spending we were doing. And then I kind of just went through line item like, oh, we spent we decided to get more of an expensive stage instead of a less expensive one because we needed to be sturdy for a song show. And that was kind of like the line byline process I kind of like went through as the someone who was coming in to present to the Committee budget finance, and I think that with the updated standardized budget practice that we're planning to implement with the bill, I think it kind of brings more organization and maybe more expansive conversations with the department representatives with their budget.

-Director Rodriguez: I was gonna say. When students, the student directors etc, come to me and say, what should we put in this memo, my advice to them is, put in so much information that there's no questions left to ask." You all should also be focused on asking the big picture questions. For example, publications come in. Why are you still printing a magazine? When can the work be online? Why are you still printing, That's a hard question. Right? And quite frankly, just neither here nor there. Things aren't printed anymore. So wine is operating being funded, right? Those are the kinds of questions you all need to be asked. It's not necessarily just about now, because a budget has been passed, but it's about the future. At the end of this year, you're going to be able to give feedback to the incoming president to say, we've had some recommendations for you. Is it really still viable that A occurred, that B occurred? You know, Couldn't you reframe and put those funds elsewhere? So don't be so focused on the details, right, of the memo, that you're of the factory of the budget and finance Committee. And your role is to provide oversight, right, to the budget as a whole, which means give recommendations, right? And maybe the record, I'm not advocating for cutting any budgets. I'm just happen to be the example that came up. Sometimes it is hard to implement midway through a year after budget's been passed that doesn't mean it can't be a recommendation for the future.

-Chair Miceli: And it makes the president, vice president's job in life's a lot easier if they aren't, you know, sort of blindly cutting things and they actually have the information they're in the way that it doesn't actually harm a lot.

-Senator Kuster had his hand raised but his question was answered previously

-Chair Miceli: So drafting the bill, and talking about what our needs are for this new standardized budget, are sort of the main overarching themes I'm hearing from this. Does anyone else.

-Senator McAndrews: I think at the end of the day, like, the main goal is just how every event and our operations are reaching the students. So if there's any data that provides more of that context, then I think that would be extremely helpful for us doing our job.

-Chair Miceli: Does anyone else have any points they want to make or any questions or concerns?

-Senator Kuster: Yeah, so maybe just for the people that have served on this committee, I think it might be help make a list of some of the things that they found helpful, that people brought in, so it could start trying to, you know, have an idea of what use template or form would look like. Like, obviously, the money they spend for students impacted, or, you know, maybe before, like, what they requested, how much they spend, just try to get a little more information on what members that are currently to think is helpful.

-Senator Hoang: think we try and talk about everything and, like Dr. Rojugguez is saying, I think a lot of the times everything they get is very comprehensive. But if we want to look back and see what's been done in the past, I mean, we have access to that on the box, we can look back on, like, what has been given in the memos and maybe even look at some of the old archives and if we want to understand that a little bit better. Again, I'm not sure of any questions on the top of my head, but, I mean, maybe you guys have anything more specific to ask, like, oh, like, what do they say about this, or say about that, then maybe I can give more of an answer.

-Senator Kuster: Yeah, and I don't necessarily mean, like, specifics, like, what this department said, that said, but just more in general. Like, besides the, anything else that comes to your minds, besides, like, how much they requested, how much they actually said students in all number, you know, estimated number of students, actual number of students. I mean, those are the four that come to mind. This is wondering if there's anything else that come to anyone else' said on terms of we're trying to make this a standardized process that there's something else that's important to also know for our data collection.

-Senator Hoang: Actually, I have one that I think would be always helpful to ask is how do they feel about their budget, do they feel constrained about the money they're spending or the money that they have left over for whatever amount of time do we have for themes? Are they constrained, or do they have too much or how do they feel about this and adding us always a good question to ask? I don't think blood was always struggling less session. So I think just asking that for a lot of people would help us better know whether or not we need to make some changes.

-Senator Barrus: I think also, maybe, like adding, like, what is the goal of their event or initiative that they're wanting to implement with the budget, I know that a lot of times, like, there is usually a goal or what they want to do with the amount being spent. So I think adding that to our data collection, maybe could help us find like a common statistic or some kind of number that kind of sticks out to the committee in the future.

-Senator McAndrews: How maybe like the demand for the event?

-Chair Miceli: think these are great great points. And I. Hand, slashes. I had a list on Saturn Custer as well of just ideas to sort of answer your question. Obviously, the money allotted versus the money you spend or what they're planning to spend, we could split it up into category. When is their largest expense? What vendors are they using? I know it might be useful to see, at least from the programming side, but really everywhere, if we can get some consistency with vendors and have numbers for that, and it would actually be interesting to compare vendors. Whether they're over budget, underpending, sort of like we talked about, and then the points that were just recently brought up, how do you feel about it? The demand slashservice, the goal of the event or initiative?

-Senator Kuster: I think that those are all amazing ideas. I think that the more nrical we can be better, maybe some kind of scale light, you know, like I love the demand and I love those ideas of like asking you, you, how they feel about their constraints. I think that crazy some kind of reason you, like one thing they felt super constrained tending, we had not thought. I think that's a great idea. a way to quantify how much, how these spinnings are feeling or the part are feeling.

-Chair Miceli: Could you. Sorry, I just want to make sure I understand. You're saying that scale would represent how they feel about the budget, or.

-Senator Kuster: Yeah, just something. Because, you know, instead of, I think that's the good I think the more can stick from data analysis a lot easier for us to see. I mean, that might be

the engineering did say, but, I was just in terms of trying to make sure that, like, I could be something like, if we can try to do, like, obviously, like, what's the goal that was going to be nume really hard for that. But something like, you know, how constrained did you feel if your budget from one to 10, maybe 10 being super constrained, one bit, not constrained at all. So that way, if we're trying to create some kind of temp foot or something that everybody uses to try to create consistency, I think coming up with the numerical representation, I think is really helped for as much as we can.

-Chair Miceli: called on Senator McAndrews

-Senator McAndrews: Um This is a little trivial, but, like, how about the date of the event? And C, maybe like, we can compare it to when other events happen at that time. But also maybe like collaborations, if other departments work together. Yeah, who were their collaborating?

-Director Rodriguez mentioned how these are good questions

-Chair Miceli asked And so are these old things, I guess this is mainly to you director or do I guess, are these all things that would be on this budget, or are we going more into a pre financial review questionnaire?

-Director Rodriguez: You're the budget of finance committee. You can literally ask, once you approve a budget form, they'll have to submit all this information. Okay.. And come on, they have all that information, right? They just don't think to put it in the budget 'cause no one's ever asked them for it.

-Chair Miceli called on Senator McAndrews

-Senator McAndrews: t this moment, is there a way that we can pull up a, like, budget cement from, like, any programming or anything so we can just look at what it looks like now. So we have this one from programming that we're looking at. Okay. I'm so sorry. Go ahead. And then, Point Mclarification is this, like, per event that's coming up? And, like, this is the only, this is the only documentation that they have to submit when it comes to whenever they throw a event.

-Director Rodriguez: According to Nevada,. Do you see how Nev the law requires governing bodies and sub bodies when they're going to spend money to put an action item on the agenda and then attach supporting documentation, right? So they're meeting Nevada Open meeting well with this.

-Senator McAndrews: o but this is it. This is it. This is the only thing that we get. And there's nothing that follows this.

-Director Rodriguez: No. No, that doesn't mean that, for example, the program has been really good about saying, let's find out what actually happened. But the data remains with them. What you're saying as a board is, we'd like to gather data for all of the bodies and committees of ASUN by passing a law that says, you'll all submit this budget requiring this information so that we get assess.

-Senator McAndrews: kay. I was. Okay, cool. So whenever any department in ASUN throws an event, they have to, they need to submit something like this.

-Direcot Rodriguez nodded in agreement

-Senator McAndrews: Okay.

-Director Rodriguez: The problem right now is the lack of consistency. And so that's the other thing we'll bring into this is consistency.

-Senator Mcandrews asked what is meant by that

-Director Rodriguez: Meaning that some buds might have a cost for a student. Uh. Others may not. Because there's no law that forces them to do this. The programming board is just super conscientious, right? I see. That being said, in all fairness, they've been around for so long, right? These other boards just started. So, yeah, they do the best they can, oh, we don't need a budget that's that complicated. We'll just use something a little bit different. They in my second inc consistency.

-Senator McAndrews: Um, just thinking about it from like, looking at this information, and I really like that idea of consistency, I would really like to see us work on a bill where maybe we follow a guideline of consistency and a along with that bill that comes from every department needing to share end of event, like, basically like numbers and reports.

-Chair Miceli: Yeah, I think those are all things that should be included.

-Senator Kuster: Yeah, I totally agree. I think that it's important to make it digital, I think it's an important against some other you do not to do data and, you can find a spot, basically do it where as they're playing out this information, we're already collecting data. It's a really important thing. And I think that may be one form. I think we were talking about the big idea of like a postper of people. I think that we can make one form that they have to go back to and submit their acts number will make everyone's lives easier, especially as well. So I think that we're

going to talk about the some ability done. One porn consistent across the board with pre and post data, I think is probably our investment.

-Chair Miceli: That's a good idea. I agree. I think keeping it all on places is a good idea.

-Senator McAndrews: That's a good idea. I agree. I think keeping it all on places is a good idea. Senator McAnders? Even has, like, an idea, too, we could just, I think, basically, I think this is what Senator Custer was saying, but if we just had a like made our own outline where it was like open to any director that needed to submit an end of event, report or a report like this for their programming. So every single time we're seeing the same exact thing, but just from different people. I think that's a very good idea. I like that.

-Chair Miceli: So I think, yeah, we can all work on this bill and think about how we want to put this form together, this budget form, and we'll go from there. I think this has been a great discussion.

-Director Rodriguez: Take the next week or two, literally go Google, budget submission forms. Yeah. You, and see corporations. Are you kidding? Do you think that they're not gonna let penny go without understanding? There's for profit world, there's the nonprofit world, and there's government entities. All of them have budget submission forms. I'm not asking you to reinvent the wheel, I'm saying there's probably something out there all, right? that you can take and and it'll be consistent, and then we can work with Erin to create some kind of middle kind of thing so that people aren't doing a whole bunch of work. -Director Rodriguez added would encourage you to first look at what you want before you start writing the film. Do the research. Again, a hard pressed to believe that this hasn't been invented somewhere else. Right. And some other college or university.
