A BINDING RESOLUTION TO DEFINE THE DUTIES AND LIAISON POSITIONS OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON FOOD INSECURITY

In the Senate of the Associated Students
August 15th, 2025
Submitted to the Senate of the Associated Students by Senator Saporito and Parliamentarian Issa

Whereas, special committees, while temporary in nature, operate under the procedural and structural framework established for standing committees, unless otherwise directed by the Senate or specified in their formation;

Whereas, in the latest version of the 92nd session Rules of The Senate, Rule X: Standing Committee Duties and Rule XI: Special Committees, there is no mention of the Special Committee on Food Insecurity or the liaison positions for the Special Committee on Food Insecurity;

Whereas, Special Committees often appear under special circumstances, and therefore are not common in nature within the student government;

Whereas, Special Committees serve an incredibly unique role within the student government;

Whereas, it is vital to communicate updates within the student government throughout its legal documents;

Whereas, it is vital to update both the student government and student body on the changes, revisions, or additions created from session-to-session;

Whereas, codifying the duties of the Special Committee within the Rules of the Senate will establish a uniformed understanding of the Committees goals, objectives, projects, and functions within the Student Government;

Whereas, codifying the duties of the Special Committee within the Rules of the Senate will ensure that clarity and transparency is prioritized to upcoming or newly-elected Senators who chose to join the Committee;

Whereas, codifying the duties of the Special Committee within the Rules of the Senate will ensure that upcoming ASUN Legislative Interns will not be confused by the development of

the Special Committee;

Whereas, any additions within the Rules of the Senate can later be edited/revised for a more accurate reading;

Whereas, an addition of subsection (c) will highlight the Duties of the Special Committee on Food Insecurity for the 93rd session;

Whereas, subsection (c) will clearly define the Special Committee on Food Insecurity;

Whereas, subsection (c) will define the Special Committee in a similar manner to the

Committees established in Rule X: Standing Committee Duties;

Whereas, subsection (c) will offer a summary of the committee for the 93rd session;

Whereas, it is vital for subsection (c) to establish the vital liaison positions founded within the Special Committee;

Whereas, Pack Provisions serves as a vital on-campus resource in the fight against food insecurity, offering free access to nutritious food, hygiene products, and support services for all members of the University of Nevada, Reno community, and fostering a supportive and equitable learning environment;

Whereas, the Desert Farming Initiative plays a pivotal role in addressing food insecurity and promoting sustainable agriculture on campus and across the region, actively collaborating with Pack Provisions and other partners to increase access to fresh, locally grown produce while advancing education, research, and food sovereignty;

Whereas, the Food Bank of Northern Nevada provides critical support to more than 160,000 individuals each month through a vast network of community partnerships and direct service programs, representing a valuable and strategic ally for the Special Committee in addressing regional food insecurity and strengthening community well-being;

Whereas, Wolf Pack Meats, a key part of the University's Experiment Station, provides hands-on education in sustainable meat processing and supports regional food systems by offering locally sourced protein, creating opportunities for student training, academic research, and community food access;

Whereas, Residential Life is dedicated to fostering a comfortable, sustainable, and inclusive living environment for all scholars, while maintaining strong connections with the student body, campus facilities, faculty, and university administration to support student success and well-being;

Whereas, Pack Rides, the University of Nevada, Reno's student-run transportation service, plays a crucial role in promoting campus safety, accessibility, and student well-being by providing free, late-night rides and weekend retail shuttles, thereby reducing transportation barriers that may contribute to food insecurity and ensuring equitable access to essential resources for all students;

Whereas, since 1979, FISH has been a vital resource for rural Northern Nevada, providing over 460,000 Food Pantry meals annually and actively engaging with the Carson City community as well as local and state government to address hunger and support those in need;

Whereas, these liaison positions will uphold duties including but not limited to; student-related issues, outreach opportunities, and general marketing;

Whereas, one of the main priorities of the Special Committee during the 93rd Session regards consistently outreaching with organizations, both on and out of campus;

Whereas, these liaison positions will be heavily recommended to not only outreach and assist their direct contact over the 93rd session, but also communicate and outreach to other neighboring organizations/facilities/faculty;

Whereas, further suggested contacts will be established in the Contact Sheet displayed within the Special Committee Files located in the UNR Box;

Whereas, with the future of the Special Committee—whether removal, continuation, or transition to a Standing Committee—subject to Senate determination at the end of the 93rd Session, the current liaison language should be struck or revised ahead of the 94th Session;

Be it resolved by the Senate of Associated Students, that the 93rd session of Senate Rules reflect the addition of subsection (c), found in Addendum A;

Addendum A

Rule XI: Special Committees

a) APPOINTMENT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES

The formation of a Special committee may occur at the discretion of the Speaker or by binding resolution of any Senator with the approval of the Senate. The Speaker shall appoint the chairperson and other members of the Special Committee, unless the motion creating the committee specifies some other method of selection.

b) Meetings and General Duties of Special Committees

Special committees shall meet at the discretion of the Chair, subject to any conditions which may be stated in the committee's formation. Special committees shall be responsible for the consideration of all questions referred to them by the Senate and the preparation of legislation as directed by the Senate in their formation or subsequent instructions, and the preparation of all reports required by these Rules or deemed necessary at the discretion of the Chair.

c) ACTIVE SPECIAL COMMITTEES

The following special committees are recognized as currently active. Each committee operates under the authority of the Senate and serves a unique function in addressing specific issues or initiatives. The committees listed here are temporary in nature but are expected to adhere to the Senate's procedural standards unless otherwise directed.

i) Special Committee on Food Insecurity

The Special Committee on Food Insecurity shall be responsible for addressing food insecurity among the student body by assessing current resources, advocating for accessible support systems/services, and working collaboratively with University and Community stakeholders to improve food accessibility. The Special Committee shall be responsible for drafting and advancing legislation related to food insecurity and awareness of food insecurity, both on and off campus. The Special Committee shall hold the Director of Pack Provisions (or a student representative appointed by the Director) as an ex officio member of the committee. The Special Committee must also deliver reports to the Senate Table throughout the 93rd session, in October and February; these reports must focus on the core pillars established by the Special Committee:

Discovery shall serve as the intellectual foundation for the Committee's operations. The Committee shall conduct, gather, and regularly review new and existing data related to food insecurity among the student population. Following the Committee's reporting duties, it shall deliver formal reports to the Senate Table in October and February, focusing specifically on progress within each of the four pillars and evaluating the impact of its initiatives.

Outreach shall focus on building and maintaining relationships with external partners, including local nonprofits, advocacy groups, and food insecurity-based organizations throughout Reno and Carson City. Outreach efforts shall provide a tangible, community-based foundation for the Committee's initiatives.

Collaboration shall emphasize strengthening internal relations with University organizations and administrations. The Committee shall actively engage with departments and student-led organizations. By participating in ongoing programs and assisting with existing initiatives, the Committee shall foster mutual support and establish a visible, reliable presence within the campus ecosystem.

Action shall focus on sustained advocacy and student engagement. This pillar emphasizes the Committee's role in mobilizing the student body through civic engagement. The Committee shall promote volunteer opportunities through platforms such as GivePulse and actively support food distribution and education efforts.

1 2 3 4 5 6	Whereas, the individuals serving in the University Police Department – Northern Command (UPDNC) courageously put themselves in harm's way daily to ensure the safety and well-being of all students, faculty, staff, and visitors at the University of Nevada, Reno (UNR), as well as at other Northern Nevada NSHE institutions, including Truckee Meadows Community College (TMCC), Western Nevada College (WNC), Great Basin College (GBC), and the Desert Research Institute (DRI);
7 8 9	Whereas , establishing a dedicated day of recognition would honor the dedication, values, and commitment of the UPDNC, while also promoting greater student awareness of the department's safety efforts, resources, and educational programming;
10 11 12	Whereas , campus safety is a shared responsibility, and UPDNC plays a critical role in maintaining a secure environment through proactive patrols, educational outreach, and emergency response services;
13 14 15	Whereas , the department, established in 1965, has provided decades of public service without formal recognition from the Associated Students of the University of Nevada (ASUN) for it continued excellence and dedication;
16 17 18	Whereas, the department offers vital services including campus escorts, event security, ridealong opportunities, victim advocacy, the SafePack App, women's self-defense classes, and student engagement tools such as PowerEngage;
19 20	Whereas, the department addresses illegal drug use and alcohol possession through educational programs such as BASICS, CASICS, SHIFT, STEPSS, and OnTRAC ¹ ;
21 22 23	Whereas , the department supports transparency and community trust by engaging students through public presentations, safety training sessions, and informal gatherings like "Coffee With A Cop," held across UNR, TMCC, and WNC campuses;
24	Whereas, UPDNC normally schedules only one "Coffee With A Cop" event each semester
25 26 27	Whereas, UPDNC hosted 127 safety-related training sessions in 2024, including women's self-defense classes, monthly safety sessions at WNC, active assailant training, and community outreach programs like "Bigs with Badges" with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Northern Nevada;
28 29 30 31	Whereas , the department made significant contributions to public safety and victim advocacy in 2024, with 325 victims contacted, 427 disclosures of trafficking, and 26 victims recovered, including a December operation recovering 17 adults and one child, resulting in 5 felony arrests;
32 33 34	Whereas , UPDNC's Victim Services Division provided support to 64 individuals across 54 new cases, many involving stalking, suicide prevention, and crisis intervention, with special attention to both NSHE affiliates and the broader community;

Rule X: STANDING COMMITTEE DUTIES

c) COMMITTEE ON SAFETY, SUSTAINABILITY, AND WELLNESS

The Committee on Safety, Sustainability and Wellness shall be responsible for policies concerning campus wide departments regarding student safety and wellness, including but not limited to: Facilities Services, university Housing, University Police, Student Health Services, Counseling Center, Campus Dining, Title IX Office, The Student Wellness Advisory Group, the ASUN Director of Sustainability and the ASUN Director of Campus Wellness. The Committee shall develop relationships with mental and physical health-related student organizations. The Committee shall assist and consult the Director of Sustainability in the promotion of sustainable campus initiatives, the Sustainable Nevada Initiative Fund, and events such as Public Lands Day, Earth Day, and Arbor Day. Along with helping UPDNC host & sponsor Coffee with Cops and designating the second Friday of October as 'A Day of Recognition for UPDNC,' the Speaker will also formally invite UPDNC to present to the Senate each October. This annual presentation will strengthen cooperation between our two departments and promote transparency. The Committee shall be responsible for legislation regarding sustainable practices on and off campus, any policy concerning student health and student safety on campus and in the community, as well as anything else that the Chair finds pertinent to the Committee. The Committee will also work with the Director of Campus Wellness to allot at least four days within the academic year for the promotion of health and wellness, and resources available to students.
