1	Whereas, the Associated Students of the University of Nevada (ASUN) represents the voice of
2	undergraduate students in matters affecting academic and campus life;
3	Whereas, laboratory courses within the College of Science are essential to preparing students for
4	professional success, offering hands-on experience in chemistry, biology, physics, and related
5	disciplines;
6	Whereas, laboratory courses often require additional fees to sustain the high-quality learning
7	environment necessary for student success, including consumable materials, equipment maintenance,
8	safety measures, and instructional technology;
9	Whereas, peer institutions maintain lab fee policies that emphasize clarity and appropriate use:
10	e.g., the University of Michigan's lab fee guidelines explicitly state that fee assessments should be
11	transparent and clearly communicated to the public, and limit fees to allowable, course-specific costs;
12	Whereas, the University of Texas System provides system-wide guidance on when to assess
13	course and lab fees and how to ensure compliance with statutes, underscoring the importance of
14	consistent, transparent practices across departments and campuses;
15	Whereas, the University of Utah's policy on special course fees specifies allowable uses (e.g.,
16	consumables, use of specialized facilities) and bars fees from supplementing general departmental
17	budgets, clarifying for students what fees can and cannot fund;
18	Whereas, students have expressed a desire for greater clarity on how these fees directly support
19	their education, with the goal of fostering a stronger sense of confidence and appreciation for the
20	resources provided;
21	Whereas, transparent communication between departments and students builds trust, enhances
22	the academic experience, and strengthens the College's reputation as a leader that attracts and retains
23	top students;

25	Be it resolved, that the ASUN Senate formally requests each department in the College of Science
26	offering laboratory courses to prepare a concise and accessible statement, affirming the ways in
27	which laboratory course fees are reinvested to sustain and enrich the student learning experience;
28	Be it further resolved, that these statements highlight the many categories of investment: such as
29	consumables, equipment upkeep, technology, safety and compliance, and other critical instructional
30	expenditures;
31	Be it further resolved, that these statements be made readily available to students through course
32	platforms (e.g., WebCampus) or departmental websites;
33	Be it further resolved, that this resolution does not seek to alter fee levels, but to celebrate the
34	College's investments in experiential science education by making the connection between fees and

Whereas, Nevada is facing a growing teacher shortage due to a lack of qualified individuals pursuing careers in education;

Whereas, completing a student teaching placement at an accredited school in the Reno/Sparks area is a requirement for earning an education degree at the University of Nevada, Reno;

Whereas, student teaching is considered a seminar course and incurs the same tuition and fees as other university courses;

Whereas, education students, both elementary and secondary, are strongly discouraged from seeking paid employment or teaching placements while student teaching, creating a financial burden;

Whereas, the University of Nevada Education Association (UofNEA) has prioritized advocating for paid student teaching positions at UNR;

Whereas, UofNEA is a chapter of the Nevada State Education Association (NSEA), a union representing teachers and aspiring educators statewide;

Whereas, UofNEA is actively collaborating with NSEA to promote policy initiatives that secure compensation for student teachers across Nevada;

Be it resolved, that the Associated Students of the University of Nevada (ASUN) formally supports the efforts of the UofNEA to secure paid student teaching opportunities;

SUBMITTED TO THE SENATE OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS BY PARLIAMENTARIAN ISSA CO-SPONSORED BY SENATOR BARRUS & SENATOR McAndrews

Whereas, Associated Students of the University of Nevada (ASUN) represents the voice of the undergraduate student body in matters affecting student academic and campus life;

Whereas, much of the student body has expressed questions and concerns regarding the scope, purpose, and impacts of PACK AI's implementation;

Whereas, it is essential that students are fully informed about changes that directly affect their educational tools, data, and academic experiences;

Whereas, a select group of Senators met with Provost Jeff Thompson and Vice President Heather Speed, who shared their vision of expanding opportunities for University of Nevada students in the area of artificial intelligence;

Whereas, many of the concerns raised by the undergraduate student body and the Senate of the Associated Students regarding PACK AI were addressed by Provost Thompson at the aforementioned meeting;

Whereas, University leadership values students' inputs and concerns regarding academic wellbeing, opportunity and future;

Whereas, PACK AI is not a mandatory implementation to the student body, rather a means to provide opportunities for undergraduate students within the University and for students' future;

Whereas, the personal data of students using PACK AI services will not be collected by third-party companies and will not be used to train any artificial intelligence model;

Whereas, there is no fiscal implication for students or the broader University to implement PACK AI;

Whereas, the University is using staff and faculty that are already researching and contributing to the development of artificial intelligence to implement PACK AI, and have not hired any additional faculty for the purpose of integrating PACK AI;

Whereas, the implementation of PACK AI provides students with the opportunity to explore artificial intelligence and its potential applications to their academic and professional careers;

Whereas, the Associated Students of the University of Nevada supports the University's mission to provide opportunities for students to succeed in achieving their academic and professional goals;

Whereas, this resolution does not take a position on the use of artificial intelligence, but instead seeks to highlight the academic and professional opportunities made available by the University;

Whereas, the ASUN Senate wishes to be informed on the implications of PACK AI in order to provide full awareness to the student body; and

Whereas, the Associated Students of the University of Nevada continues to foster the relationship with University Administration, in order to best serve the students of the University of Nevada, Reno;

Be it resolved, that the Associated Students of the University of Nevada formally request that University Administration provide a presentation to the Senate of the Associated Students regarding the implementation of PACK AI, including but not limited to its intended functions, impacts on academic platforms and curriculum, data usage policies, data protection and privacy, student support resources and effects on students fees;

Be it further resolved, that the Associated Student of the University of Nevada formally request University Administration to inform students of available opportunities, address potential concerns, and communicate their vision for how PACK AI may support students and their future endeavors;

Be it further resolved, that ASUN urges University Administration to provide continued updates to student leadership throughout PACK AI's rollout; and
